2025 SUMMER RESEARCH AND ADVOCACY INTERN Cornell Center on the Death Penalty Worldwide

The Cornell Center on Death Penalty Worldwide invites law students to apply for its summer 2025 Research and Advocacy Internships. Applications will be reviewed on a rolling basis.

The Center is seeking dedicated law students with excellent research, writing, and communication skills, a passion for justice, and a demonstrated commitment to human rights. The ideal candidate will have familiarity with racial and gender justice issues, and interest in death penalty abolition, and public defense/criminal defense. This internship is especially beneficial to students interested in careers involving capital defense, death penalty abolition, international human rights, movement lawyering, and criminal defense/public defense.

Interns will have the opportunity to gain valuable experience working closely with the Center's attorneys and partner organizations. Interns will:

- Work with a team of researchers and advocates to analyze gender bias in the criminal legal system.
- Help build a national movement of advocates concerned about women facing extreme sentences.
- Compile empirical data and contribute legal analysis to the Center's Alice Project on the rights of women facing capital punishment around the world.
- Publish blog posts.
- Conduct legal research and writing relevant to the Center's publications and other work training defense teams around the world, advancing abolition, and centering criminalized survivors.

The planned dates of the internship are Tuesday, May 20 through Thursday, July 30, 2025.

The internships are full-time. The selected candidates may choose to work in-person in Ithaca, NY or remotely in the U.S. (pending university approval if working outside New York State). Please note that the New York Convenience of employer guidelines require New York State individual tax reporting and withholdings for this position. Additional individual state income tax filings may also be required if working outside New York State.

The Center is not able to consider applications from candidates who are not based in the U.S. or are not eligible to work in the U.S.

Cornell Law students applying must obtain Public Interest Fellowship (PIF) funding. Students applying from other law schools must obtain summer public interest and/or federal work study funding from their home institutions. Students who need an early decision on their applications to qualify for support are encouraged to advise the Center of their situation and request expedited review.

- 1. Cover letter explaining their interest in the Center and its work, any relevant experience, and what they hope to gain from the position.
- 2. CV or resume.
- 3. An unedited writing sample demonstrating the ability to write clearly and concisely.

The final deadline to submit application materials is March 31, 2025. Early applications are encouraged. Interviews will start in late February/early March, and offers will be made on a rolling basis.
